Regulatory Update

Glyphosate in Crops

New Zealand Food Safety Authority has proposed an increase in the default MRL for glyphosate in grains for human consumption from 0.1 mg/kg to 10 mg/kg in cereals (wheat, barley and oat) and 6 mg/kg in dry field peas. The Codex MRLs are 30 mg/kg (wheat, barley and oat). It has become evident that glyphosate usage is an emotive topic and New Zealand Food Safety Authority are considering the large number of submissions received. SGNZ is engaging with officials to ensure they have accurate information about our industry practice.

Gene Technology Bill

The government has extended the timeframe for the report back from the select committee to parliament until 10 October 2025. We will engage with members further once we know what the next version of the Bill and secondary legislation contains.

Treated Seed Group Standard

We are having regular conversations and exchange of information with the Environmental Protection Authority about the proposed group standard for treated seed to contribute to their development of fit for purpose regulations. We seek regulation that enables seed business to be conducted efficiently and effectively and that simultaneously protects people and the environment from the chemicals used in seed treatments. We look forward to hosting EPA staff at seed treatment sites in Canterbury on 15th September to demonstrate seed treatment practices in action, including the activities undertaken by practitioners to safeguard people and the environment.

Industry News

Launch of the NZ Grown Grains Initiative

To support local grain production and boost consumer awareness, FAR, Eat NZ, and the Arable Food Industry Council (SGNZ is a member of AFIC) have launched the New Zealand Grown Grains Initiative. This initiative introduces a trademark to be used on packaging, labelling, and promotional material for products containing at least 80 percent New Zealand grown grain. There has already been strong interest from bakeries and flour millers in using this logo. The logo aims to create consumer demand and brand recognition for New Zealand grown grain.



This initiative of course will benefit many members of SGNZ if it results in more grain being produced in New Zealand. If there is full industry support for this logo and traction is made, the possibilities are endless.

Seed Crop Isolation Distance (SCID)

The Seed Crop Isolation Distance tool is a vital industry-led tool that enables our high-value seed producers to produce seed crops without pollen contamination from neighbouring crops. The purpose of the SCID scheme is to avoid potential outcrossing of vegetable seed crops by maintaining isolation distances, prior to sowing, to minimize the risks of crop failure through cross-pollinating species planted too close to each other.

The SCID Annual General Meeting was held on 30th July 2025 and got approval of the updated Code of Practice for users. You can find the Code of Practice here.

Plant Breeders Forum

New Zealand Plant Breeding & Research Association (NZPBRA) held the second Plant Breeders Forum on 7th August in Christchurch attracting 70 representatives from across the pastoral, horticultural and forestry sectors.

The primary focus of the Forum was to discuss the likely impact of the new Gene Technology Bill by debating the risks, challenges and opportunities that could result. We heard how the gene regulator (OGTR) in Australia operates, and how the use of a "market choice" framework enabled industry led co-existence systems.

Four NZ plant breeding programmes/approaches were highlighted: kiwifruit, pine trees, apple and pears, and forage plants. The possibility of using GM and gene editing in these economically important plants was discussed. The importance of being able to create new traits of value in these economically important species was the major driver for seeking to use GM and gene editing methods, where appropriate, alongside unregulated plant breeding methods.



Contribution to Seed and Grain NZ Agriculture

SGNZ contributed information to MPI's June 2025 <u>SOPI report</u> [SC1] which is available at this link. The SOPI report provides export value figures, showing that the Arable sector had export revenue of NZ\$349 million, representing 1% of the total revenue from primary industries.

The SGNZ Executive and CE Sarah Clark have been taking every opportunity with government officials to highlight the bigger story behind those figures. This includes the huge impact the industry has in supporting the high export-value sectors of dairy, and meat & wool sectors through supply of high quality grass, forage and grain inputs.
