

BIOSECURITY NEWS

It's been a busy couple of months with lots happening across the regulatory space. There have been several updates and new opportunities to provide feedback – here's a quick overview.

The Health Select Committee has released its report on the Gene Technology Bill, recommending the Bill be passed – but with some amendments. SGNZ is working through what this means for members and will be providing further information in the coming weeks.

In other news, the EPA has extended the timeframe for its proposed group standard for treated seed. A second round of consultation is now planned for early 2026, giving everyone a bit more time to engage with the process.

For exporters, MPI Plant Exports is reviewing how it recovers the cost of providing export phytosanitary certification and is asking for feedback by 31 October – now is the time to have your say if this affects you.

Gene Tech Bill Update: Select Committee report released

The Health Select Committee has released its report on the Gene Technology Bill, recommending that the Bill be passed with amendments. The Health Select Committee's role was to review the Gene Tech Bill, consider public submissions, and suggest amendments. It's now up to Parliament to decide whether to accept those changes and whether the Bill should progress. At its Second Reading, MPs will debate the Bill and vote on whether it moves forward. If the vote is lost, the Bill does not proceed. NZ First have indicated they supported the changes present in the Select Committee report, but it would not support the Bill into law without further major changes (Radio New Zealand 13 October 2025).

<u>Update on EPA's proposed group standard for treated seed</u>

The EPA are currently analysing submissions and the further information received on the Proposed group standard for treated seed. Due to issues raised during the Q1 2025 submissions, a second round of public consultation is planned for early 2026, lasting around four weeks. SGNZ will be submitting on the second round of consultation and will be calling on members to ensure appropriate feedback is given.

The Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) is reviewing how much it charges to recover the costs of providing export phytosanitary certification for plant products (including seeds). The full consultation information is available here.

MPI is proposing two options to reduce the projected deficit.

Option 1: Immediate recovery: Apply a one-off fee increase for 13 months from 1 December 2025 until 31 December 2026. (MPI's preferred option)

Option 2: Gradual recovery: Increase fees over 3 years (2025–26 to 2027–28). Proposed rates (Information from Section 1.2 Tables 2 and 3)

Note: Indicative 2028/29 rates decrease as growth in certificate volume is forecast to exceed inflation.

To smooth rate changes, MPI normally recovers deficits over three years. In this case, MPI is seeking to recover the \$2.731 million deficit over 13 months (1 November 2025 to 30 December 2026) as:

- the deficit has existed since 2020. However, a longer recovery period makes it more likely that costs would be recovered from firms who were not exporting when the deficit was incurred; and
- a shorter recovery period will ensure the increased fees impact exporters over a shorter timeframe, before resetting to the cost of delivering phytosanitary certification only.

MPI want to know:

- 1. Which pricing option is the preferred approach (Option 1 or 2)?
- 2.If there are factors or issues MPI should consider when addressing the current deficit in the phytosanitary certificate amount?
- 3. Any further details to support our preferred option?

SGNZ will submit on behalf of its members based on provided feedback. Feedback to date is that Option 2 is the preferred choice. Individual submissions are also welcome.

The EPA Visits Canterbury Seed Treaters

SGNZ, Barenbrug New Zealand and Luisetti Seeds hosted several EPA staff at their Canterbury seed treatment sites in mid-September.

The group used the opportunity to delve into the Proposed group standard for treated seed, highlighting those practical issues raised by members. The EPA were very engaged in the discussion and used the opportunity to go through questions they also had.



SGNZ are continuing to regularly engage with the EPA to contribute to their development of fit for purpose regulations for treated seed. We are hoping to host the EPA in the North Island later this year and are looking forward to continued collaboration.

Following a meeting with MPI in October, we were informed about ongoing detections of live pea weevil. You can currently treat pea seeds either off-shore or on-arrival in NZ and detections do not reflect a biosecurity failure. However, because of these ongoing detections we have been asked to reiterate best practice guidelines, which include:

When importing pea seed (particularly pea seed for on-arrival treatment) ensure:

- Outer seed packaging is robust
- Pallets are robustly sealed
- · Packaging is strong enough to survive additional air cargo handling

What to do if you see pea weevil

If pea weevil is detected during unpacking or other handling, secure the infested seed, try to catch the pea weevil, photograph it and call MPI on 0800 80 99 66. Further information on pea weevil can be found <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>.

Tomato Brown Rugose Fruit Virus: Ongoing Awareness

Australia is introducing new import testing requirements for tomato and capsicum seed. From 12 November 2025 – full information is available here.

- only test reports from department-authorised laboratories will be accepted for ToBRFV (and Tomato Mottle Mosaic Virus, ToMMV)
- updated diagnostic protocols (qPCR) for testing ToBRFV and ToMMV must be used setting a
 defined threshold cycle/quantification cycle (Ct/Cq) cut-off value of 35 to determine the results of
 each of the qPCR tests
- information required on lab reports needs to be updated

Farm Saved Seed Declaration

Under a voluntary declaration, farmers who save and replant PVRE-protected seed pay the rights-holder an annual royalty based n usage per calendar year. The ability to collect royalties is an important part of ensuring incentives for research and development in plant breeding. In return New Zealand farmers receive improved yields and quality from new barley and wheat varieties.

Royalties will only apply to those farmers who use saved seed varieties that are on the eligible list and protected by law. Click here for more information and the declaration form.
